Pancreas Club History

The 35 year history of the Pancreas Club Inc was published in a special supplement of the February 2004 issue of the Journal of Gastrointestinal Surgery. The history summarizes the development of the organization from a small informal Sunday meeting to an international Forum including experts on a wide variety of pancreatic diseases.

Yet, throughout its evolution, the Club has retained an informal egalitarian style with few trappings of office and welcoming new members based only on their interest in the pancreas (and of course payment of their dues!)

Contribution of professionally recognized surgeons, basic scientists, and physicians are documented along with an interesting evolution of the meeting and organization of the Pancreas Club itself. Subsequent founding and growth of international pancreas organizations are also included.

It is unique, but characteristic of the democratic nature of the Club that much of the historical content has been contributed by the members themselves in the form of personal vignettes relating how each individual became interested in pancreatic disease, thereby developing a career of contribution of the body of knowledge regarding disorders of this complex organ.

Some of the history of the Pancreas Club Inc is irretrievably lost, such as who attended the first meeting other than those presenting papers (we have a copy of the first meeting's program). More importantly, the authors wanted to communicate the excitement and passion of the early meetings.

Those attending these early meetings (mostly

surgeons) in studying the pancreas had taken as Robert Frost said, "the road less traveled." Usually one of a kind at their institution, they were professionally isolated (remember this was before E-Mail!).

The Pancreas Club Inc. provided an opportunity for the members having similar professional goals the invaluable experience of sharing ideas and getting feedback from their peers. These meetings, which combined professional and social interactions, rapidly created a "band of brothers."

This feeling of comradeship still permeates the organization and expresses itself in its receptiveness and openness to new members and guests. Those with an interest in the Pancreas should find the history a rewarding document.
