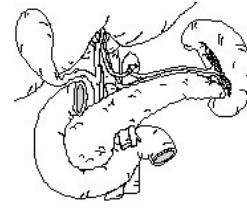

SHUTTLE SERVICE

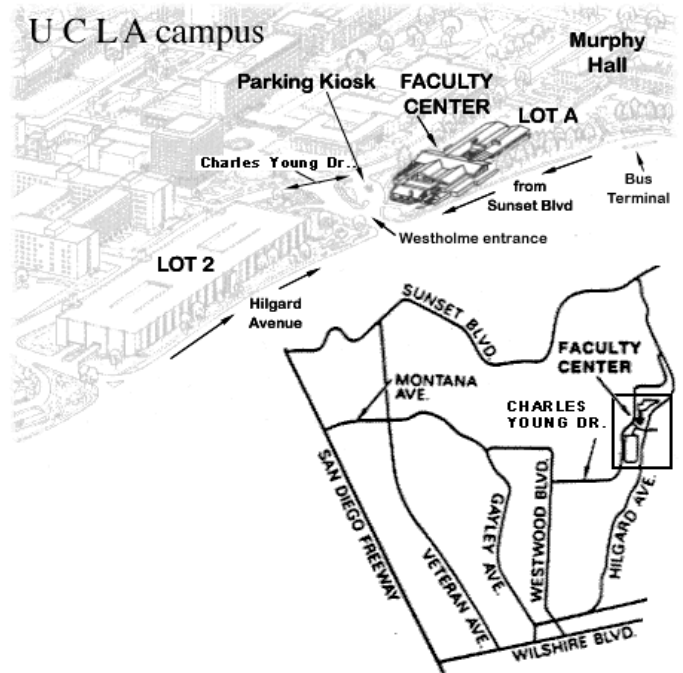

Trouble Free PowerPoint Presentation

- Bring your files on floppy, CD, USB flash drive, or Zip Disk (250mb or 100MB).
- Files will be loaded into a networked PC/MAC system wired remotely to a high output (2000 lumen) Infocus LCD projector.
- At the podium, there will be a wireless remote/laser pointer (with slide Forward and Reverse control) and a regular mouse to advance your slides and to start/stop your videos in PowerPoint.
- Also at the podium will be an 8" LCD monitor to view your presentation without having to look at the screen.
